CPSC.gov Guidelines:

Beginning June 28, 2011, all cribs manufactured and sold (including resale) must comply with new and improved federal safety standards. The new rules, which apply to full-size and non full-size cribs, prohibit the manufacture or sale of traditional drop-side rail cribs, strengthen crib slats and mattress supports, improve the quality of hardware and require more rigorous testing. Definition: A drop-side crib is a baby crib where one or more of the sides slides down to allow easier access to baby. The sliding side means that parents don't have to reach over as far to pick up a baby in the crib. Drop-side cribs can be single-drop side, where only one side moves, or double-drop side, where both of the long sides slide down.

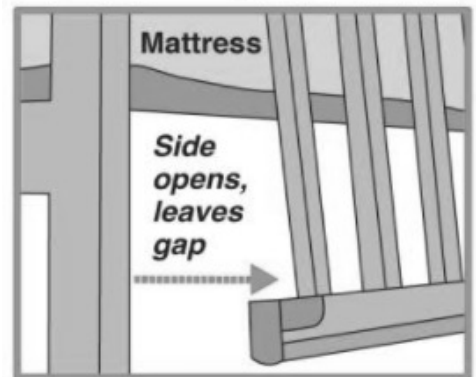

Crib safety

Defective drop-side cribs could pose a suffocation or entrapment risk for infants.

Unsafe crib

- Faulty hardware breaks; crib's drop-side opens, making gap between mattress and drop-side



- An infant or toddler's body can become entrapped in the space; can cause strangulation or suffocation
